Why Volunteer as a Laurel Chain Society Chair?

Laurel Chain Society Chairs (LCSCs) work closely with the Head Class Agents (HCAs) throughout the five-year reunion cycle to develop a strategic plan to promote the Laurel Chain Society and encourage consistent giving.

Stay connected to the Mount Holyoke community:

- Receive the most **current information about College** priorities and initiatives
- **Connect** with your classmates and other MHC alums

Gain valuable skills and experience:

- Gain **fundraising experience** and training
- Attend **volunteer events** and **network** with other alums

Make a meaningful and immediate impact on Mount Holyoke's mission:

- Share why you are a consistent donor
- Share information with classmates about how their consistent annual gifts have an **immediate and positive effect** on students' experience

Job Description

Make your annual gift—lead by example:

- Make your **annual gift or pledge** so you can say “join me as a Laurel Chain Society member”

Stay in touch with MHC:

- Check your email regularly and stay in touch with your Head Class Agents
- **Stay informed**—read the monthly Mount Holyoke Fund volunteer update emails and if you use social media, follow MHC channels

Connect your classmates back to MHC:

- **Share news from MHC**—via mail, email, phone, text message, or social media
- Get to **know what is happening in their lives**, how they feel about MHC, who they stay in touch with
- **Explain the impact of consistent giving** to The Mount Holyoke Fund and encourage them to make a gift
- **Answer Questions about the Laurel Chain Society**

Frequently Asked Questions

Do I need special skills?

If you are willing to contact classmates, share MHC news, and are not afraid to say why continued financial support matters to Mount Holyoke, **you are exactly the kind of Laurel Chain Society Chair your class needs**. Your Head Class Agents and Mount Holyoke Fund staff liaison provide support, information, and encouragement.

Can I take on a Laurel Chain Society Chair role when I'm already busy?

Yes! The time commitment for this role is flexible and varies throughout the year. During peak fundraising times in December and May/June, your outreach to classmates will be key, though you can choose the particular days that you contact classmates. One time of year when we will ask for your help with outreach on specific days is during our 48-hour-long giving challenge in March.
